

The UN Environment Assembly, the world's highest-level decision-making body on the environment, will gather in Nairobi, Kenya, from 4-6 December 2017 under the overarching theme of pollution.

The UN Environment Assembly has the universal membership of all 193 UN Member States and the full involvement of UN organizations, specialized agencies, inter-governmental organizations, civil society and the private sector. In bringing together these varied communities, the Assembly provides a groundbreaking platform for leadership on global environmental policy.

This year's Assembly will be sustainable and climate-neutral, and it will feature side events that confront pollution in its various forms. The Assembly aims to deliver a number of tangible commitments to end the pollution of our air, land, waterways, and oceans, and to safely manage our chemicals and waste. These will include the following:

- A political declaration on pollution, linked to the Sustainable Development Goals, to signal that humanity can work together to eliminate the threat of pollution and the destruction of our planet
- · Resolutions and decisions adopted by Member States to address specific dimensions of pollution
- Voluntary commitments by Governments, private sector entities and civil society organizations to clean up the planet
- The #BeatPollution Pledge, a collection of individual commitments to clean up the planet

- 27-28 November: Civil society will host the Global Major Groups and Stakeholders Forum, which facilitates the
 participation of civil society in the Environment Assembly and associated meetings.
- 29 November 1 December: The Committee of Permanent Representatives will hold its third open-ended meeting.
- 2-3 December: The Science, Policy and Business Forum will bring together top scientists, citizen groups, policymakers and business leaders to promote and operationalize science-driven policies and innovations that address planetary challenges and support the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals.
- 3-6 December 2017: The Sustainable Innovation Expo will take place on the margins of the Assembly and will
 complement the high-profile Leadership Dialogues. The Expo will showcase that science teaches problem
 solving; it will also encourage critical thinking in how important, though small, our world is. The Expo will
 also engage participants in the oldest science of all—astronomy.

This year's Assembly will also launch the interactive Leadership Dialogues, which will provide participants with an opportunity for high-level engagement and discussion on how to achieve a pollution-free planet.

Notification by the Executive Director

Third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly of the United Nations Environment

(Nairobi, 4-6 December 2017)

- The third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly of the United Nations
 Environment Programme will be held in Nairobi from 4 to 6 December 2017, under the theme,
 "Towards a Pollution-Free Planet". The session will be opened at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, 4
 December 2017 at the headquarters of UN Environment Programme in Nairobi. The session
 will be preceded by informal consultations between regional groups and the Executive
 Director on Sunday, 3 December 2017.
- The third Open Ended meeting of the Committee of Permanent Representatives, which will take place from Wednesday 29 November to Friday 1 December 2017, will serve as its main preparatory meeting. The Agenda and relevant documentation for this meeting, including draft resolutions for consideration of the Assembly, will be made available at the <u>Committee's</u> website.
- 3. Member States considering the submission of draft resolutions linked to the theme of the Assembly are invited to submit them in writing to the Secretariat by the 22rd of September of 2017 in order for these to be considered by the Committee of Permanent Representatives in keeping with its mandate set out in decision 27/2 of February 2013. At the request of Committee of Permanent Representatives, all draft resolutions will be made available on the Assembly's resolutions platform.
- 4. The Assembly's provisional agenda (UNEP/EA.3/1) is set out as annex to the present notification. The advance version of background report of the Executive Director for the theme of the session, the scenario note for the meeting and other relevant background information is being made available in the documents section of the <u>UN Environment Assembly website</u>.
- The High Level Segment of the session will take place on Thursday, 5 and Friday, 6 December 2017. It will include sessions for national statements as well as Leadership Dialogues. In accordance with decision 27/2 (paragraph 5 e), the High Level Segment will include a multistakeholder dialogue that will bring in diverse perspectives building on the theme.
- 6. The third Session of the UN Environment Assembly will feature a number of significant events. The attention of delegates is drawn to the 17th Global Major Groups and Stakeholder Forum, which will take place from Monday, 27 to Tuesday, 28 December 2017. Delegates may participate as observers. A Science Policy and Business Forum will take place on Sunday 3 December 2017. The 2017 Sustainable Innovation Expo will take place from 4 to 6 December 2017. In addition, six side events and two media events will take place, providing opportunities for inspiring dialogue and motivating action.

7. Under rule 16 of the rules of procedure, an accredited representative, who may be accompanied by such alternate representatives and advisers as may be required, shall represent each Member State of the Assembly. In accordance with rule 17 of the rules of procedure, the credentials of representatives should be submitted to the Executive Director prior to the first meeting of the session. Member States are invited to send a copy of the credentials, signed by either Head of State/Government or Minister of Foreign Affairs, by Wednesday, 15 November 2017, two weeks ahead to Mr. Stadler Trengove (unex.spb@unex.org) and submit the original upon arrival. Member States representatives submitting original credentials concerning their participation should hand them in at the registration desk upon their arrival at the United Nations Office at Nairobi.

- The United Nations Environment Assembly is open to the participation of representatives of
 specialized agencies, United Nations bodies and other intergovernmental organizations and
 regional economic integration organizations. Representatives of these organizations are
 urged to communicate to the Secretariat (unep.spb@unep.org) their intention to participate
 as observers in the meeting in order to make the necessary arrangements.
- On-line pre-registration for the third Open Ended meeting of the Committee of Permanent
 Representatives and the third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly will be
 available on the dedicated <u>Environment Assembly website</u> from 30 August 2017.
- 10. All delegates and participants, including representatives from United Nations entities, specialized agencies and other intergovernmental organizations and international non-governmental organizations must pre-register on-line, and upload a PDF copy of a letter of accreditation. The letter of accreditation should be on official letterhead and signed by a duly authorized representative and include the name(s) of the delegate(s) or representative(s). The hard copy of the letter of accreditation must be physically submitted at the on-site registration desk. On-site registration will open from 08:00 hrs to 17:00 hrs from 26 November 2017 to 06 December 2017 at the United Nations Complex, Nairobi.
- 11. In line with UN Environment Programme practice, the third Session of the UN Environment Assembly will be made paper-smart. To make the best use of this service, delegates are encouraged to bring appropriate mobile devices and consult the <u>Assembly website</u> to obtain more information.



Opening of the session

The third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly of the United Nations Environment Programme will be opened at 10 a.m. on Monday, 4 December 2017, by Mr. Edgar Gutiérrez, President of the United Nations Environment Assembly, elected at its second session, held in Nairobi from 23 to 27 May 2016.

Item 2

Organization of work

The President will draw the attention of the United Nations Environment Assembly to the provisional agenda (UNEP/EA.3/1) and propose its adoption.

Organization of work

- In accordance with rule 13 of the rules of procedure, the President shall then invite the United Nations Environment Assembly to allocate items among its plenary meetings and the meetings of any sessional committees, including a Committee of the Whole, and working parties that may be set up in accordance with rule 61.
- 4. In the establishment of those committees and working parties, the United Nations Environment Assembly will take into account the proposed organization of work as outlined in the note of the Executive Director on the organization of the third session of the Assembly (UNEP/EA.3/INF/1). It will also take into account the compilation of draft resolutions prepared by the Committee of Permanent Representatives to the Environment Programme for consideration and adoption by the

Item 3 Credentials of representatives

In accordance with rule 17 of the rules of procedure, the Bureau of the United Nations Environment Assembly will report to the Assembly at its first plenary meeting on the credentials of representatives in attendance.

Report of the Committee of Permanent Representatives

Performance of the programme of work and budget, including implementation of the resolutions of the Environment Assembly

Under this item, the United Nations Environment Assembly is expected to focus on the conclusions reached at the third open-ended meeting of the Committee of Permanent Representatives with regard to the updates submitted by the Executive Director of the Environment Programme, mandated by resolutions adopted by the Assembly at its second session. The Assembly may wish to allocate this item to the Committee of the Whole.

Administrative and budgetary issues

The United Nations Environment Assembly is expected to consider other relevant administrative and budgetary issues, based on a presentation given by the secretariat.

International environmental policy and governance issues

Under this item, the United Nations Environment Assembly will consider items and proposals pertaining to the theme of the third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly, "Towards a pollution-free planet". Other supplementary issues may also be discussed under this agenda item at the request of any authority entitled to propose items under paragraph 1 of rule 9 of the rules of procedure.

Update on the Sixth Global Environment Outlook

10. The United Nations Environment Assembly is expected to consider the progress report of the Executive Director on the sixth edition of the Global Environment Outlook (GEO-6) contained in document UNEP/EA.3/21. The Assembly may wish to allocate this item to the Committee of the

11. The high-level segment will convene on 5 and 6 December 2017 and will address the overarching theme "Towards a pollution-free planet". The segment is expected to consist of an opening plenary with statements by key dignitaries; national statements; leadership dialogues; a multi- stakeholder dialogue; a gala dinner; a wrap-up plenary session; and a closing plenary session Discussions will be supported by the Background report of the Executive Director on the theme of the third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly, "Towards a pollution-free planet" (UNEP/EA.3/INF/3). Adoption of the outcomes of the session

During the concluding plenary of the United Nations Environment Assembly in the afternoon of Wednesday, 6 December 2017, the President is expected to invite the chairs of the sessional committees and working parties to report on the outcomes of their respective work, including on the agreements reached on draft resolutions and the outcome document of the high-level segment. The Assembly may wish to consider and adopt those outcomes.

Item 11

Election of officers

13. At its final plenary meeting and in accordance with rule 18 of the rules of procedure, the United Nations Environment Assembly will elect a president, eight vice-presidents and a rapporteur from among its members. The President is expected to be nominated from among the Eastern European States and the Rapporteur from among the Asia-Pacific States. The eight Vice-Presidents will include two nominated officers drawn from the African States, one from the Asia-Pacific States, one from the Eastern European States, two from the Latin American and Caribbean States and two from the Western European and other States. It is expected that the election will be conducted by acclamation, based on the list of nominees received from each region by the President of the Assembly prior to the last meeting of the third session.

14. The United Nations Environment Assembly may wish to consider and agree on the date and provisional agenda of its fourth session as set out in document UNEP/EA.3/INF/

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

Ministerial Declaration of the 2017 UN Environment Assembly "Towards a Pollution-Free Planet"

Final draft

As the world's ministers of the environment, we represent around seven billion men, women and children, rich and poor, young and old, from every nation, faith and culture on this beautiful, but fragile planet. We believe that every one of those people should be able to live in a clean environment. Our water, air and soil are our most precious natural resources. Any threat to them is a threat to our health, our society, our ecosystems, our economy, our security and our very survival. That threat is already upon us and is cutting short the lives of millions of people every year.

That is why we are gathered at this third session of the United Nations Environment Assembly to work towards a pollution-free planet, with political, industrial, scientific and civil society leaders. It is also why we believe it is imperative that we alert people everywhere to the following.

- 1. Every day, 9 out of 10 of us breathe air that is unsafe and 20,000 people will die because of it. Nearly 2,000 children below the age of five will die from dirty water and poor hygiene. Women and girls continue to be disproportionately affected, whether it be from cooking with dirty fuel or walking further to find safe water. Countless millions suffer health problems because every year we dump up to 13 million tonnes of plastic in our oceans and 50 million tonnes of electronic waste on our land.
- 2. We cannot even measure the human impact of allowing thousands of chemicals to be used in everyday objects without proper testing, labelling or tracking. We believe that it is both inexcusable and preventable. Far too many communities either lack information about the chemicals and hazardous substances they use or are exposed to, or the capacity to manage them safely.
- 3. However, we also believe that the knowledge and technological solutions to reduce pollution already exist, though many stakeholders have yet to explore and implement the many opportunities available. We are encouraged by the numerous success stories of countries, cities and businesses addressing air, soil, freshwater and marine pollution issues. Recent examples include the adoption of the Kigali Amendment to the Montreal Protocol and the entry into force of the Minamata Convention on Mercury.
- 4. As countries strive to deliver the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Paris Agreement, we acknowledge the links between pollution, climate change, biodiversity loss and ecosystem degradation. Tackling pollution will contribute to national sustainable development by fighting poverty, improving health, creating decent jobs, improving life below water and on land, and reducing global warming.
- 5. We are concerned by the legacy of damage and pollution that armed conflict causes to the environment, often delaying recovery and threatening the health of people and ecosystems.
- 6. We are also concerned that unsustainable land management creates phenomena such as sand and dust storms, wildfires, and others which pose a great challenge to sustainable development.
- 7. We are convinced that determination, collaboration, knowledge generation and sharing, innovation and clean technology are transforming these challenges into opportunities to tackle pollution, but that we can do more.
- 8. Therefore, we are determined to scale up actions that prevent, mitigate and manage the pollution of air, land and soil freshwater and oceans
 - a. We will encourage the development, collation and use of reliable scientific data. This will include providing better multidisciplinary indicators; improving capacity for efficient gathering, verification and monitoring of data; and increasing transparency by making it easier to access such information more widely.
 - b. We will promote evidence-based decision making in the public and private sectors, effective standard setting by all stakeholders and greater participation by individuals from all walks of life.
 - c. We will target all forms of pollutants through environmental agreements and tailored action.
 - d. We will accelerate the implementation of existing multilateral agreements, conventions and regulations to

- prevent, control and reduce pollution. Where the science is clear that such policies and actions should exist, but do not, we will develop them. Where the impact is not yet clear, we will increase research.
- e. We will foster economic productivity, innovation, job creation and environmentally sound technologies.
- f. We will stimulate sustainable consumption and production, by making it easier to rethink, reuse, recycle, recover and remake any products, materials and services.
- g. We will promote the adoption of policies and approaches for the sound management of chemicals and waste, including the use of integrated life cycle, value chains and sustainable chemistry.
- h. We will make the best use of policy links, trade, investment and innovation opportunities.
- i. We will work with local governments to encourage sustainable models of urban development.
- j. We will promote fiscal incentives to stimulate positive changes. This will include capturing the true cost of pollution, including its externalities, in financial decisions and redirecting investment from the short-term profits of polluting activities to the more sustainable profits of greener alternatives.
- k. We will strengthen and enforce more integrated policies, regulations and laws. We will achieve this by supporting institutions and building capacity; bolstering monitoring and accountability systems; and sharing best practices, standards, policy instruments and tools.
- 1. We will create and expand multi-stakeholder partnerships, under the auspices of the United Nations, between governments, the private sector, academia, civil society and individuals.
- m. We will use South-South cooperation, regional dialogue and coordination across the United Nations to target
- 9. As ministers of environment, we recognize our role in delivering these commitments and promoting coordinated action. We will focus on preventive measures, taking account of each country's responsibilities and capacities. We will also emphasise the need for greater cooperation, through such means as the exchange of experiences, resources and technologies, while taking into consideration the Rio Principles on Environment and Development.
- 10. However, responsibility for combatting pollution does not rest with national governments alone. We need support from the private sector, international organizations, civil society and individuals. Everyone has a responsibility as mothers and fathers, husbands and wives, partners, sisters and brothers, friends, employers, colleagues, neighbours
- 11. We cannot overstate the need for rapid, large-scale and co-ordinated action against pollution and applaud the [XXXX]2 pledges made in the Beat Pollution engagement campaign.
- 12. We support the actions and resolutions agreed by the Third Session of the UN Environment Assembly.
- 13. We acknowledge the magnitude of challenges and opportunities in the report by the Executive Director of the United Nations Environment Programme, Towards a Pollution-Free Planet3 and invite all stakeholders to use it.
- 14. Moving towards a pollution-free planet is a long-term endeavour. We request the Executive Director of the United Nations Environment Programme to engage stakeholders in proposing a common plan for implementation for our consideration
- 15. We will advocate for this declaration, including at the high-level political forum on sustainable development, and we will follow up on its implementation at our next session in 2019.
- 16. This is our commitment to sounding the alarm on the health and wellbeing of our people, and to working towards a pollution-free planet.

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
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

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
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
